


5 Reasons You Would Not Have Wanted to be a Constable in Pittsburgh Before 1816






Pittsburgh, August 28, 1789.

"The hand of oppression would by me never be uplifted [against] the affilicted widow or helpless orphan"

East-Caln, Chester County, May 6, 1776. MADE his escape, the 5th of this instant, in the after-noon, from the Constable, a certain James Fitze, or Fitzpatrick, who was under a commitment for affault and battery upon a Constable, when in the execution of his office; he is a Blacksmith by trade, about 5 feet 6 inches high, this country born, but of native Irish parents; brown curled hair, thick lips, grey eyes, a furly impudent wicked fellow; had on, when he went away, for his best suit, an old Wilton coat, brown cottonvelvet jacket and breeches, with red buttons on the jacket, half worn fur hat; his other clothes not known: Took with him a small Mare and Saddle, whose property I cannot tell. Whoever takes up faid fellow, and delivers him in Chefter Goal, in this county, or to the subscriber, in East-Caln, shall receive the reward of Four Dollars, from SAMUEL COATES, Confable.

** Whoever takes said Fitze is desired to look sharp after him, as he is well used to escaping from the Constables.
