"Where do people hurt?" became Dr. John Galbreath's abiding question, compelling soul searching and practical service within our community and beyond. Each successive generation answered this question inspired by Jesus who said, "I came not to be served, but to serve."

After all the tumult of recent years, how fitting for us to celebrate the 75th anniversary of Westminster's founding. We too have endured conflicts and a pandemic and yet emerge with a renewed sense of gratitude for Westminster.

On September 26, we will celebrate the anniversary of the first worship service held by what became the Westminster congregation. Throughout the year, we plan to mark many of the milestones from the fledgling congregation that grew in strength and breadth.

To complement our worship and remembrances, we will celebrate. The Deacons Gala, on October 2 at Valley Brook Country Club, will be the first of several gatherings held to draw us together. Stay tuned for several other occasions in the plans.

At some point, the spark of Jesus' love for you took hold and continues to animate your faith.

Tell us your dreams. Imagine what we can do to serve people who hurt in the 21st century. Why do you present your children for baptism, drop them off at JAM or confirmation? What more can we do to serve in Christ's name as we shop, pack, and feed others in the community? Just as the steeple reaches to the heights, what might the breadth of our digital presence mean for enduring connections and faith?

Throughout the coming year, we will share your stories and dreams to remind everyone why we belong to God through Christ and one another at Westminster. This is hard and holy work we do together.

At Westminster's 40th anniversary, Dr. Galbreath wrote, "But, the real importance of this occasion is not to look back, but to see in these years the foundation upon which Westminster builds for coming years. It is the future, not the past, that we have come to celebrate. Westminster's greatest days of mission lie ahead."

At Westminster Church, we strive to be a welcoming congregation. During one of my pastoral visits, one of our saints shared the touching story of her welcoming experience.

"When I was raising my family we had a family business. My husband and I spent every 'free' minute trying to make it a success. Between raising four active children and keeping house, just getting dinner on the table every night was a chore, life was busy. We got to church on Sunday, but I never had time for any social activities at the church. As the children got older, they were on their own, so finally I decided to go to one of the special events with the Women's Association. I arrived just before the program began. When I walked in the room, to my dismay everyone was seated and all the chairs were filled around the tables.

"I stood to the side feeling awkward and wondering if I should just back out slowly and go home. Actually, I was kicking myself for even trying something new. That was when Diane stood up! She called over, Anna please come with me. You and I can sit together over here. Quickly she arranged for chairs and placemats to come to an empty table. Diane and I

sat together for the entire presentation. No one else joined us but we had the best time. I can't tell you what the program was that day, but I will never forget the kindness and welcome I received from Diane. Even today my heart is full thinking about her."

This account talks more about welcoming than I can possibly relay. At some time, each one of us has been the awkward person standing on the sidelines wondering where to sit or how to fit in while everyone else seems to have a friend. Jesus was always inviting the lost, lonely, and the least into his company. Jesus invited himself to dinner at Zacchaeus' house, he talked with the rejected Samaritan woman, he accepted the gift of the woman's oil at dinner while the formal religious leaders looked on with disdain. Let our welcome be like Jesus, extended to everyone. There is always room at the Lord's table. Especially in these days when we may not be physically in the same room, welcoming one another with creative love can truly change someone's life.




Day Away

A big part of me wants to start this article with the line "Here we go again!" But the rest of me knows that it's simply not accurate. Though for many of us it's true that we're diving into another fall of ministry, community, and life together here at Westminster. Yet the landscape continues to change. Take your thinking a few levels deeper on that one: yes, think more deeply than the calendar year, more deeply than staff changes, think beyond COVID protocols. Surely all of those are true, but the landscape is different because you and I are different.

We've all grown, changed, and learned in these past summer months. Many of us have made intentional changes; some of us are simply looking out at life through different lenses. Christ has continued to move in all of our hearts. I think that's an important reminder from time to time. I've spoken with many, many people who feel caught in the "loop" of life: the same pattern, day after day, week after week. God's love for you is constant, but his methods are unique, specific, and individual to your life each and every day. This also happens to pave the way for another insight: if you feel as though you're experiencing God in the same ways that you always have, you might just be missing out on something new. God is offering you something new every morning

Many of us are looking forward to the return of familiar ministries, so it's true that in one sense, "Here we go again!" But I'd encourage you to look out at the horizon with new eyes, with a new perspective. God has done new things for you each morning; the same will be true this fall. So as we step forward to community of all kinds, keep an eye out for the new work that God has done in your life and in the lives of those around you.


Westminster Book Group

Through the daily "Path of Peace" reflections, we are encouraged to define and deepen our calling as peacemakers. "This season is a time of encouragement, challenge, inspiration, and education," said Carl Horton, teaching elder and coordinator of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program.

This resource is designed to culminate in the Peace & Global Witness Offering on Sunday, October 3. The daily reflections offer insight and connection among Presbyterians, inviting the Spirit to strengthen and support one another in shared life and ministry.

I'm often asked how we, as Presbyterians and Christians, define "peace" and how do we really expect to be peacemakers in today's world? In his article for *Presbyterians Today* (July/August 2021), Carl Horton offers a clear perspective of the peace we seek. We are reminded that peace is a dominant biblical theme that brings us

back to the realization that peace in all terms is a gift from God.

Horton describes how Presbyterians have been "...bearers of peace" in our response to conflict and injustice and through the denomination's peacemaking program. The program is recognized "as the work of the church at all levels."

I seek to more fully serve God as a peacemaker and when I fall short, I am reminded to accept God's gifts with gratitude. Horton's thoughts on the work of peace inspire me to carry on this task. He states:

For Presbyterians, peace is more than an idea or a declaration. It is the work we do, and it requires both compassion and justice. As peacemakers, we are both compassion-bearers and justiceseekers, meeting the needs of the world around us and righting the wrongs that, still today, impede justice for all.

When I was in my sophomore year of college I lived at home with my parents. On Wednesday nights my mom volunteered at Westminster and my dad worked late. Those nights were quiet – sometimes lonely. I'm not sure how exactly I got roped in to volunteering with my mom, but I did. We worked with 5th & 6th grade kids in JAM and spent time playing "hey fishy fishy" and acting out Bible stories in silly skits. I would tell anyone who would listen how impressive these kids were. They absolutely blew me away.

See, around that age kids transition their thought process from a purely black and white view to a more abstract one. Around the same time, they start questioning their parents' authority (if you're a parent, I bet you are rolling your eyes right about now), so this is the perfect time for kids to explore faith. For their whole lives, their parents and Sunday school teachers have been teaching them about God, but around 5th and 6th grade is typically when children start asking questions and reading scripture in a way similar to the way they would read text in school - critically. They quickly begin to realize the gravity of what Christ did for us and how miraculous his ministry really was (and is). I fell in love with watching this faith journey unfold and was coming to JAM every single week. It also helped that the group of kids in the program were hilarious and genuinely enjoyable to be around.

I finished college and moved on to working for Hilton hotels in sales and events. I loved my job, but still tried to make sure my schedule allowed me to make it to Westminster by 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday nights. After a few years and a couple bride-zillas, I found myself interviewing for a job opportunity at Westminster. Those Westminster kids were there to support me, but in a whole new way this time.

Every fall, Veritas begins with a new theme for the year – based on a specific piece of Scripture. This year we are

focusing on 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18: "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." I don't need to remind you how trying the last year has been. Staring at a couple dozen teenagers on a Zoom call is not nearly as exciting as riding down a water slide or playing mini golf. Yet, the kids kept me laughing and continued to impress me with their insights in faith. Even with all of the struggles, I found myself actively searching for the reasons to rejoice, which is what inspired me to choose this theme for the year. Even if case numbers go up, we need to stay focused on the good things that still exist in our lives.

The first group of JAM kids I worked with graduated from high school this past spring. For the first time, I'll start fall programming without them. As much as I watched and helped them grow, they watched and helped me grow as well. They absolutely made an impact on my life forever.

Even though that group will be scattered across the country this fall, about 65 students will walk through the north entry at the end of August. And every single one of those kids is as insightful, hilarious, and special as the bunch I met when I was 19. They will inspire and impress me in new and different ways. God will continue to give me reasons to rejoice.

I'll end with a challenge. I know we all rejoice for different reasons, but I ask you to take a peek into this one of mine. Pay attention to what Veritas is doing this year. Follow us on Instagram or check our website. Watch for the ways we are connecting with one another. Come spend an hour or two with us on a Wednesday night and give the Veritas students the opportunity to wow you. Jesus trusted his ministry with young people. Let me show you what they can do.

MISSION ON THE MOVE

Westminster's Mission in India

Jesus tells us to "love our neighbors as ourselves." Westminster has been loving our neighbors in India for the past 31 years, when 10% of a capital campaign funded a cardiac monitor for Miraj Medical Centre and provided operating funds for Sangli Industrial School (SIS), Creche Nurses Training Centre (CNTC), and Vadeketh Development Centre which offers therapy for mentally and physically disadvantaged children. Prabhat Tara Sanstha (Bright Morning Star) offers support through worship

flooding in 2019. Westminster's Endowment Fund provided nearly \$46,000 to repair the building and to replace damaged equipment used to train auto mechanics, HVAC, welding, and electrician students. Without this project the school could not have remained certified and would have closed.

Sangli Industrial School was founded in 1888 by a Scottish engineer to train boys, especially Christian boys, who would not be allowed to learn a trade

services and nutritional and pastoral care for children who are clothed, fed, educated, and treated for HIV/ AIDS. This ministry's relationship with Westminster began when Creche Nurses Training Centre closed. Westminster has provided generations of underserved students and patients in Miraj, India, with life-changing education and support.

This year Sangli Industrial School was completely renovated. Its 125-yearold main Chapel Hall was severely damaged by destructive monsoon otherwise. The Chapel Hall holds about 300 people and provides classroom space around its perimeter for such trades as electrician, welder, fitter, auto mechanic, small engine repair, HVAC and refrigeration, computer operations, carpentry, and tailoring. Other nearby outbuildings house work areas for these trades. A hostel and kitchen make available food and lodging for most of the students.

Miraj, India, is 8,163 miles from Upper St. Clair, USA. Despite the distance, since 1990 Westminster has sponsored nine mission trips to India. A tenth trip is being planned once travel restrictions end. If you are interested in being part of the team to make the tenth visit to Miraj, contact Doug Mitchell at 724-316-7511.

Baby Bundles: A Mission to New Mothers (and Not-so-new Grandmothers)

Everybody loves a new baby – and grandmothers everywhere love shopping and knitting and crocheting for them. But those babies grow up to become teenagers, and their gift lists often include things most of us grandparents can't even pronounce. And while buying the latest electronic gizmo for them can be fun, it's just not the same as making something soft and sweet, and we miss doing that.

The other side of this story is the East Liberty Family Health Care Center where new mothers often find themselves with limited means for providing even the basics. But they, too, would like to have some of those beautiful clothes and soft blankets for their precious new ones.

As often happens in the church, people who have and people who need find one another. And this is the magic of Baby Bundles.

We are a group of women who in our small way are following the call of Jesus in Matthew 25: "I was naked and you gave me clothing." We knit, crochet, and sew blankets and gather new and gently worn baby clothes from Westminster's rummage sale, donations from members, and more recently, from the City Mission Hidden Treasures store. Our Outreach Commission budget funds the purchase of a digital thermometer for each recipient. Each bundle includes sleepwear, onesies, hats, socks, at least one "dress-up" outfit, and a hand-written note. All these are gathered together in the Baby Bundles which are then delivered to new mothers in East Liberty.

Debby Underwood started this project seven years ago after her grandchildren were grown and she "had no one to knit for." There is no definite schedule for the bundling meetings. Debbie gets a call from the East Liberty Center when their supplies run low, and she notifies our Westminster group. We all watch for inexpensive or free items, and those with knitting or crocheting skills work on blankets throughout the year. We meet at Westminster to gather, sort, and bundle the items.

Grief Care is a faith-based grief support group that can help you face the challenges of loss and move toward rebuilding your life. Please contact Louise Rogers if you have any questions.


